

First Lady gives support, encouragement to Vicenza military families

A Summer Family Fun Day at Villagio Housing Area that included children's activities and a family barbecue on June 19 was made all the more exciting because of a very special guest, First Lady of the United States Michelle Obama. Soldiers, families, Department of Defense civilians and Italian nationals excitedly welcomed Mrs. Obama to Vicenza when she visited to spend time with military families. Attendees were thrilled to spend the day with the First Lady, who brought along

daughters Malia and Sasha, mother Marian Robinson, and a niece.

"I was so happy that the First Lady of the United States could join us and recognize the sacrifices and service of our Soldiers, families and civilians, and everyone who works here in Vicenza," said Col. Robert L. Menist Jr., U.S. Army Garrison Vicenza commander. "It was a special, historical event that we were privileged to host."

Before Obama's arrival to the podium, the Italian and United States national anthems were sung by Gianpietro Lenna, a member of the Vicenza Polizia Locale, and Sgt. Amanda Donohue, USAG Vicenza, respectively. Then U.S. Ambassador John Phillips, ambassador to the Italian Republic and the Republic of San Marino, said a few words.

"The First Lady has visited with military families around the world, and today she is here in Vicenza," Phillips said. "You have built an impressive community. Remember that we are all American ambassadors, and you represent the best America has to offer."

Maj. Gen. Darryl A. Williams, commander of U.S. Army Africa, then introduced the First Lady to a cheering crowd. Mrs. Obama greeted the group and spoke for about 15 minutes, emphasizing her support and thanking servicemembers and their families for all they do. She began speaking, however, by taking a solemn moment to reflect on the violent shootings that took place at a Charleston, S.C., church only two days before her arrival here.

"There is something particularly horrifying about something that happens so senselessly in a house of worship," she said of the attack. "And we have seen too many tragedies like this." But there is always hope, she added, that such tragedies will come to an end.

"That's why I like to come to visit (Soldiers and their families)," Obama said. "There is a sense of hope in you, and that's why I'm here—to thank you all, to thank every single one of you."

One of her missions as First Lady, Obama added, is to make sure she "shines a really bright light" on Soldiers and their families.

"I want all Americans to understand that military families don't stop, that you face challenges that many don't even understand. ... When you're overseas, the simplest things are amplified—taking a trip, trying to catch the bus, learning the language, going to get supplies, (taking a sick child) to the hospital. Not to mention

that your spouse may be whisked away at a moment's notice," she said. "Those sacrifices are what make you heroic."

After her remarks Mrs. Obama posed for photos, then joined her family members to serve ice cream to the children in attendance with the help of Soldiers and USO volunteers. Another highlight of the day was the Books on Bases presentation at the Youth Center. The program was kicked off by Malia and Sasha as they shared a reading of "Unicorn Thinks He's Pretty Great" by Bob Shea to a crowd of about 200 children. The girls were followed by their mother and Menist, who collaborated on an animated reading of "Don't Play with Your Food," also written by Shea.

Menist said he enjoyed reading aloud to the children with Mrs. Obama. "She was very warm, very cordial, and you could tell she was touched to be here and be a part of our Soldiers' and families' lives," he said.

The final special event took place when Mrs. Obama joined with Operation Shower, Glam4Good, and other organizations to surprise approximately 25 expectant mothers with a baby shower. The moms-to-be were showered with gifts and makeover opportunities while participating in the first international shower thrown by the organization. 173rd Airborne Brigade opens new heavy equipment drop zone in northern Italy

VICENZA, Italy—Paratroopers from the 173rd Airborne Brigade conducted a demonstration of the brigade's airdrop capabilities by parachuting a military Humvee from a U.S. Air Force C-130 for Italian civic and military leaders at Frida IV Drop Zone near Dandolo, Italy, June 25.

The demonstration is the last part of a six-year project to get a drop zone capable of handling heavy equipment in northeastern Italy, about 30 miles from Aviano Air Base, where the 173rd's airdrop and parachute rigging section is located. "It will be a tremendous benefit for the 173rd to have a heavy drop zone right here near Aviano, closer to Vicenza," said Chief Warrant Officer 4 Richard Clark, the brigade's senior airdrop technician. "Once this drop

zone is approved, we will no longer have to spend extra time, energy and fuel to train in Pisa, or Germany."

Italian army officials from the Friuli Venezia Giulia regional military command, regional and municipal representatives, Italian veterans, and the press viewed the jump as well.

The 173rd Airborne Brigade, based in Vicenza, Italy, is the U.S. Army Contingency Force for Europe, and as such must be ready to aerially insert forces and equipment anywhere in the U.S. European, Central and Africa Commands' areas of operations in 18 hours or less.

Only a few airborne units have organic parachute riggers assigned to them; the 173rd is one of those units. The parachute riggers, part of the 173rd Brigade Support Battalion, must constantly train on their aerial delivery rigging capabilities to remain certified and fit for the fight.

"You need to maintain that edge as

a parachute rigger, because at any time the brigade can call us and ask us to drop anything, anywhere in the world – it's what we do," said Clark.

While the brigade's paratroopers conduct multiple parachute operations in Italy and throughout Europe every month, they only conduct on average one heavy airdrop operation per month, due to lack of an approved drop zone in the Veneto region.

"This is important training for the 173rd, as well as the U.S. Air Force," said Italian army Sgt. Maj. Luca Bertozzo, the brigade's senior noncommissioned liaison officer. "It's not just training for combat operations, but also for the delivery of emergency equipment in case of local disaster: ambulances, food, water, and medicine – anything that can go on an airdrop platform."

In order for an area to be certified for airdrop capabilities, a sensible

location must be located and then surveyed; making sure it meets certain size requirements. Then the survey must be submitted to the first U.S. Air Force general officer responsible for that area of operation. Drop zones in foreign areas must then be approved through the bureaucratic process of the host government.

On hand for the demonstration was Dr. Mariagrazia Santoro, the regional councilor for planning, Friuli Venezia Giulia, where the new drop zone is located.

"It's very important for Italian and American paratroopers to be able to do training like this here," said Santoro. "By training during peacetime, we will be better prepared during times of natural disasters or war."

Santoro, a staunch supporter of allied Italian-U.S. training, is a member of the Italian committee that brings together military and civil authorities for the joint management of military training areas. "Italy and the United States have a special relationship and together we can manage the training area together in a professional and respectful way," she said. "Our joined training is important because our forces together can give all they can for democracy and support our shared regional security."

When developing the drop zone, a former tank range, the American

and Italian governments joined together to clear it of unexploded ordinance, while being sensitive to the environmental concerns of the local community.

"We cleaned up the area to make it better than it was before," said Bertozzo. "We are applying the strictest rules and considerations in terms of environmental protection – some of the highest standards in Europe. Italian civilians even use the area on the weekends for camping and spending time with nature."

Once the drop zone receives its final certification, the 173rd is expected to airdrop one to three loads a month.

"This is the first drop we have done on Frida IV and good things will come from this," said Clark. "None of this would have been possible without the support of our military and civilian allies here in this community and in Rome. I would really like to thank them for allowing us the opportunity to demonstrate our airdrop capabilities and am looking forward to more bilateral training opportunities."

Paratroopers kick off BALTOPS 15 with combined joint air assault

ABOARD HMS OCEAN, Baltic Sea -

Paratroopers from the 173rd Airborne Brigade kicked off BALTOPS 15 with a sea-launched air assault mission onto a beachhead near Ravlunda, Sweden, June 10.

BALTOPS, in its 43rd year, is an annual U.S.-lead, multinational exercise designed to enhance flexibility and interoperability, as well as demonstrate the resolve of allied and partner forces to defend the Baltic region.

Paratroopers from Company D, 2nd Battalion, 503rd Infantry Regiment are the only U.S. Army unit participating in the exercise, which has brought together approximately 5,600 ground, maritime and air forces from 17 NATO and partner nations.

"This exercise represents an important opportunity for our forces, as allies and partners, to enhance our ability to work together and strengthen capabilities required to maintain regional security," said U.S. Navy Vice Adm. James Foggo III, exercise director and commander, U.S. 6th Fleet and Striking and Support Forces NATO.

The paratroopers arrived in Ravlunda, Sweden, and then boarded HMS Ocean, a British Royal Navy amphibious helicopter carrier anchored off the coast. For the next two weeks, they will be at sea to train with an attached Finnish marine antitank missile platoon from the Nyland Brigade, and other U.S., allies and partner forces.

"There is no other conventional unit in the Army that carries out the types of missions that the 173rd Airborne Brigade does," said U.S. Army Capt.

Matthew McCarthy, commander, Company D. "This exercise allows us to demonstrate the use of sea-based platforms to deliver our paratroopers wherever they are needed."

The combined company carried out their first exercise together, an air assault from a British Royal Air Force CH-47 helicopter, launched from HMS Ocean.

"Today's training mission with the Finnish marines is just the first of many exercises that we have planned throughout the next couple of weeks," said U.S. Army Sgt. 1st Class Travis A. Knudsen, a platoon sergeant with Company D. "This sort of combined, joint training further enhances the 173rd's capabilities to work with, and increase interoperability with, our European partners and allies in a tactical environment."

Having a Finnish platoon, part of the 2015 NATO Reaction Force, attached

to the company is providing an opportunity for realistic maritime training by the two groups in order to build experience and teamwork by training on unifying NATO tactics, techniques and procedures.

"During the air assault, the Finnish tactics blended seamlessly with ours," said Knudsen. "We had no trouble shooting, moving or communicating with them. Going into our future training with them, or even a real-world mission, I now know how they operate and what to expect from them."


The Finns agreed.

"Our training together is getting better and more efficient as we work together on our standardized operating procedures," said Finnish marine Lt.j.g. Daniel P. Forsell.

BALTOPS is the first part of a five-month deployment to the Baltic region for the paratroopers of Company D. After this exercise, they will transition up to Estonia and Poland as part of U.S. Army Europe's Operation Atlantic Resolve North, a practical demonstration of the United States' commitment to European regional security.

BALTOPS is just one of the multinational regional exercises, along with Saber Strike, that the 173rd is currently a part of in the Baltics and Poland.

"The 173rd, as a forwardly positioned unit, shows U.S. shared commitment to regional stability and security by participating in exercises like BALTOPS and Saber Strike, training with and alongside European forces in order to promote peace in the region," said Sgt. Sean Fitzgibbons, an intelligence analyst with 2nd Battalion, 503rd Infantry Regiment.

Leaders from allied nations collaborate for success

ALMERIA, Spain – When faced with challenges of working side-by-side with counterparts from another military, Legionnaire 1st Lt. Oscar Fraile realizes that he shares many similarities with U.S. Army 1st Lt. James Duval.

“It is more similar than I expected,” said Fraile, in reference to the U.S. Army’s ground movements through urban terrain.

Fraile and Duval used their combined expertise to prepare for a series of live-fire exercises during African Readiness Training 15, a combined arms exercise held June 1-19 in Almeria, Spain.

Fraile is a platoon leader assigned to 8th Bandera, 3rd Tercio, 2nd Brigade Spanish Legion. Duval is a platoon leader with 3rd Platoon, A Company, 4th Battalion, 6th Infantry Regiment, 3rd Brigade, 1st Armored Division.

Duval is one of more than 150 Soldiers from the 6th Inf. Reg. in Almeria to partner with the Spanish Legion during ART 15. Joining the group are more than 20 U.S. Marines from the

Marine Air-Ground Task Force.

“The intent for this exercise is to improve combined and joint interoperability of all participating forces,” said Duval. While discussing strategic movements, Fraile and Duval’s conversation incidentally lead to an exchange of personal experiences.

“I was excited to find out I would be leading my platoon in Spain,” Duval said. “I would have the opportunity to cross train my troops with Legionnaires.”

“Training with the Legion gives my Soldiers perspective, one they cannot get while stationed at Fort Bliss, into how foreign militaries operate,” Duval.

“It broadens my leadership experience as well,” said Duval, who up to this point has been to Israel and South Korea during Reserve Officers’ Training Corps. This isn’t the first time that Fraile has worked with U.S. Soldiers.

“I too, seek to broaden my leadership experience,” Fraile said. Previously, Fraile had trained at West Point during a month-long foreign officer exchange program when he was a cadet at the Spanish Legion’s Academy for General Military.

In comparing their organizational training styles, Fraile said he only noted a few differences.

Duval said he had rehearsed with his platoon, knowing there would be differences.

“My platoon comes from a heavy armored unit where they use mechanized equipment, like the M2 Bradley Fighting Vehicle,” Duval said. “They are not use to conducting ground movements like the Legion.”

“That is why we are focusing on enhancing our dismounted movements and land navigation skills,” said Duval. “To link our two training styles.”

According to Duval, the biggest obstacle he noticed was breaking the language and cultural barriers.

“We brought Spanish-speaking Soldiers to help break the ice,” Duval said.

According to Duval, some of his Soldiers have extended their hospitality to the Legionnaires, even exchanging professional gear such as hats, patches, and multi-use tools.

“For instance,” Duval said, “Specialist John Ridgley, a medic assigned to 3rd Platoon, spoke of an encounter he had with a Legionnaire that ended with the two exchanging patches.”

“We talked about our jobs, our cultures and interests,” said Ridgley. “It was very humbling, to create a friendship with members of a foreign military.”

“They treat us like family,” he said.

Ridgley said during their conversation he realized he stood on common ground with the Legionary and he wanted to commemorate the bonding of their new friendship by exchanging patches, a common practice among service members from different militaries.

"I offered him my deployment patch," Ridgley said.

"He was floored by my gesture," said Ridgley, after explaining the significant value of the patch to the Legionnaire.

"Such trades signify alliance, respect, and a mutual interest in each other's culture," said Duval.

Similarities, differences and a mutual understanding of each other's background put the two platoon

leaders on a level playing field; one that they will be able to build upon during their training together.

This type of collaboration is an example of the U.S. Army's intent to create enduring partnerships and future interoperability with allied nations.

"The differences between us are not what matters, it is what we learn from one another that matters," said Duval.

ALMERIA, Spain – Breaking the ice in a foreign country can be difficult if you don't speak the language, or so Spc. John Ridgley thought.

One of Ridgley's battle buddies, Spc. Alejandro Vedia offered to help by translating English to Spanish for him. "I'd like to pay those Legionnaires order," said Ridgley. Vedia translated the message in Spanish to a waitress in the base cantina.

Before Ridgley knew it, he was being flagged by the Legionnaires to come sit with them. Ridgley and Vedia obliged. The Specialists are two of more than 150 Soldiers assigned to

4th Battalion, 6th Infantry Regiment, 3rd Brigade, 1st Armored Division, working in Almeria, Spain. They're participating in African Readiness Training 15, a combined arms exercise with the Spanish Legion and Marines from 2nd Platoon, F Company, 2nd Battalion, 8th Marines, June 1-19.

The intended goal of the exercise is to improve combined and joint interoperability participating of forces. Ridgley, a native of Lemoore, Calif., said the Legionnaires seemed surprised that a stranger would pay for their order.

"Why did you pay for us? You don't know us," said one of the Legionnaires. Ridgley asked for their names.

"I'm Samuel and this is Sanchez Ruiz

Gonzalo," said Samuel Luna Tapia. "We are with the 2nd Brigade Spanish Legion."

"Now we know each other," Ridgley replied. "One team, one fight."

The four talked about what they do, where they come from, and how their cultures differ.

The bonds created between the four servicemen contributes to the overall intent of the exercise to improve interoperability among the participating militaries.

"They made me feel like I was at home and not 3,000-miles away," said Ridgley.

WIESBADEN, Germany -- The 509th Signal Battalion in Vicenza, Italy was recently recognized as one of the Army's best in logistics, being named a winner in the Chief of Staff of the Army's Combined Logistics Excellence Awards.

Army Chief of Staff Gen. Ray Odierno presented the unit with a Supply Excellence Award at a ceremony June 10 at the Pentagon, recognizing it for extraordinary supply and support operations, property accountability and resource management.

"Winning the award for us is a validation of our current logistical processes, the technical expertise of our team, and our clear understanding of where we have to excel," said Taleh Aliyev, the 509th Signal Battalion S4. Aliyev said the unit could not have won the award without the hard work, technical expertise and advice from both subordinate company S4s and from the 2nd Signal Brigade S4, and 5th Signal Command and U.S.

Army Network Enterprise Technology Command G4 teams.

The CLEA program's objectives, according to the Army Quartermaster website, are to enhance logistical readiness of all Army units, enforce the Command Supply Discipline Program (CSDP), encourage the use of available resources, and provide a structure for recognition of group and individual initiatives.

The primary criteria for evaluation are demonstrated success in supervisory and managerial responsibilities IAW Army standard supply policy and procedures, the Command Supply Discipline Program (CSDP), and the Army management philosophy. Evaluation guidelines and scoring criteria within each level are administered based on AR 710-2 Appendix B. Units must attain a total composite score of 90% or better to meet the CSDP and SEA standards to be eligible and compete for winner, runner-up, or honorable mention.

Lt. Col. Schawn Branch, commander of the 509th Signal Battalion, said, "It is truly an honor for the unit to be selected for this award at the CSA level, however, I'm not overly surprised as this selection is indicative of the tal-

ented group of professionals that are in the 509th."

The 509th Signal Battalion S4 team consists of three Department of the Army civilians, one noncommissioned officer, and one host nation employee.

"Our S4 team provides logistical support to battalion and other external elements located in 7 countries and 12 different sites throughout Italy, the Balkans, the African continent, and the Mediterranean," Aliyev said.

He said the battalion used "less paper" and "virtual office" initiatives to digitize workflow and reduce or replace many paper and printing requirements. Going paperless allowed the battalion's supply office to conserve paper and reduce their inventory of printers, and allowed for greater visibility and better accountability of supplies and equipment across the battalion and up the chain of command as well.

"This award is recognition of the efforts each company commander and member of 509th Signal Battalion has put toward CSDP," Aliyev said. "It is an achievement to be remembered and proud of for years to come."

US, Italian signaleers conduct bilateral communications training

LEGNAGO, Italy - Signaleers from the 173rd Airborne Brigade and the Italian 8th Parachute Assault Engineer Regiment conducted joint communications training here June 16.

"For our American Red Cross volunteers in Italy, this event is a unique opportunity to join in the International Red Cross Red Crescent movement," said Katherine Jones-Sperling, American Red Cross senior station manager.

"This Fiaccolata is one of the most memorable experiences I had so far in Italy," said volunteer Andrea Johnson. "As a Red Cross volunteer it is a humbling experience and great to be around so many people with the goal of putting others above themselves."

Wildlife center lets families experience fun of flora and fauna

For a relaxing day with the entire family, the Gallorose Wildlife center located in Cecina (LI) about 40 minutes drive from Camp Darby is the ideal location.

The park hosts Tuscan native animals like chickens, cows, donkeys, rabbits, tortoises, guinea pigs as well as zebras, camels, kangaroos, hyenas, monkeys, lynxes, vultures, eagles, owls and many other species.

The Gallorose Park includes over 250 species of animals as well as 14,000 different flowers and plants.

The path winds through the park for about three kilometers on a plain dirt road which is easy to walk with strollers. Water fountains and rest rooms can be found along the path.

About halfway along the path is a coffee bar, restaurant and play area for children. The restaurant offers typical Tuscan food like pappardelle or lasagne with wild boar sauce, grilled meats and a variety of appetizers, all prepared by the owner of the farm business.

Along the route it is possible to visit some exhibits displaying old farming machinery, an old craft museum, and nativity sets from all over the world.

Visitors should expect to complete the path in about three hours. It is open daily from 10 a.m. to sunset.

The park opened in June 2001 and was then upgraded and extended in 2006 when it also became a wildlife center. It also contains a farm where exotic animals and native breeds are raised.
