



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# Columbus Day message from IMCOM commander

The landing of Columbus in the New World is celebrated as Columbus Day in the United States, as Discovery Day in the Bahamas, and as Día de las Américas (Day of the Americas) in Belize and Uruguay. In 1792, New York City and other U.S. cities celebrated the 300th anniversary of his landing in the New World, and President Benjamin Harrison called upon the people of the United States to celebrate Columbus Day on the 400th anniversary of the event, as well. Though people have celebrated Columbus' voyage since the colonial period, Columbus Day first became an official state holiday in Colorado in 1906, and didn't become a federal holiday in the United States until 1937.

Since Columbus Day is a federal holiday and three-day weekend, many of our Soldiers, Army Civilians, and their Families will take advantage of one of the last opportunities to enjoy the great outdoors before winter sets in. This increases the risk of accidents, and we all need to do our part to keep our Army Family strong and safe.

Many of you have teenaged drivers, and special precautions are warranted. Even though obtaining a driver license is a much more in-depth process than it used to be, state laws may not be enough to fully protect new teen drivers. Household rules about passengers, nighttime driving, and cell phone use can fill gaps in state laws. The National Highway

Shorter days and cooler evenings mean fall is here – and this is often the time that we start seeing people sick with flu. By getting a flu vaccine for yourself and your entire family every season, you can help prevent flu-related illness, missed school, and missed work. Also, keeping your hands clean is one of the best ways to keep from getting sick and avoid spreading germs to others.

Finally, fall marks the start of football season, and many of you have loved ones participating. To help ensure the health and safety of our young athletes, CDC developed the "Heads Up: Concussion in Youth Sports" initiative to offer information about concussions - a type of traumatic brain injury - to coaches, parents, and athletes involved in youth sports. ## Red Ribbon Week begins Oct. 23



**VICENZA** -- The Red Ribbon Campaign is the oldest and largest drug prevention program in the nation, reaching millions of young people during Red Ribbon Week, Oct. 23-31 each year. The mission of the Red Ribbon Campaign is to present a unified and visible commitment towards the creation of a drug-free America.

The National Family Partnership organized the first Red Ribbon campaign in 1985 in response to the kidnapping, torture and murder of Drug Enforcement Agency Agent Enrique Camarena.

Camarena had been working undercover in Guadalajara, Mexico, for more than four years and his efforts led to the discovery of a multimillion-dollar narcotics

manufacturing operation. On Feb. 7, 1985, Camarena left his office in Mexico City, and five men appeared at the agent's side and shoved him into a car. One month later his body was found with signs of torture.

In honor of Camarena's memory and his battle against illegal drugs, friends and neighbors in his hometown began to wear red ribbons. California Congressman Duncan Hunter and teacher David Dhillon launched "Camarena Clubs" in California high schools. They embraced his belief that one person can make a difference, and they also adopted the symbol of Camarena's memory, the red ribbon.

In 1986, club members presented a proclamation to Nancy Reagan First Lady of the United States, who had initiated nationwide anti-drug programs. The following year, parent-teacher organizations in Cal-

ifornia, Illinois and Virginia wore the red ribbons in late October and November. In 1988, National Family Partnership organized the first National Red Ribbon Week.

In 1990, Department of Defense joined in the national effort by commencing a program to encourage service members to keep communities drug-free and to recognize outstanding outreach programs.

Today, the Red Ribbon serves as a catalyst to mobilize communities to educate youth and encourage participation in drug prevention activities. Since that time, the campaign has reached millions. This year's Red Ribbon Week theme is, "Respect Yourself. Be Drug Free."

# Italy to Ukraine

## Paratroopers travel through allied countries in convoy

**VICENZA** -- Paratroopers from the 173rd Airborne Brigade completed a 1,850 km convoy from Italy to Yavoriv, Ukraine, in support of Operation Fearless Guardian, Sept. 11.

"The convoy demonstrates the effectiveness of the cooperation between the 173rd Abn. Bde. and our European allies and partners," said Capt. Joshua Gilly, transportation planner for the 173rd Airborne Brigade Support Battalion.

"The long drive from Italy to Ukraine would not be possible without allied assistance -- it's been truly a multinational effort."

This convoy, the third in support of paratroopers deployed to Fearless Guardian, the training of Ukraine's newly formed national guard, syncs with the beginning of


third training rotation by the 173rd.

Along the route, paratroopers met with host-nation officials and engaged with the local populace.

"It was nice to meet people on the way; people seemed happy to see us," said 2nd Lt. Amanda Dolsen, convoy commander. "I was excited to meet with Ukrainians, who were excited that we are contributing to the efforts for a better Ukraine."

Fearless Guardian is the name for the congressionally approved, Departments of State and Defense initiative under the Global Security Contingency Fund-Ukraine.

The paratroopers are in Ukraine at the request of the Ukrainian government to train several battalions of the newly established Ukrainian national guard. The training is scheduled to last until November.

# US, French Foreign Legion conduct training in Corsica

**CALVI, France** -- Paratroopers assigned to 173rd Airborne Brigade conducted bilateral training with the French 2nd Foreign Parachute Regiment, French Foreign Legion, during Exercise Kevi Blanc here, Sept. 1-16.

Kevi Blanc, named for the distinctive headgear worn by the Foreign Legion, is a training exercise between the United States and France designed to strengthen NATO capabilities through allied training and to establish a lasting partnership between the countries' airborne units.

"It was a great training opportunity to expand our interoperability between our NATO allies," said Sgt. 1st Class Ronald Cole, scout platoon sergeant, 1st Battalion, 503rd Infantry Regiment. "It was the first time our unit has worked with the French Foreign Legion and hopefully we have opened the doors for future training with them."

Paratroopers began by conducting combined marksmanship training and exchanging close-quarters marksmanship training techniques. During that time, the legionnaires, who qualified with the U.S. standards, were awarded U.S. marksmanship badges.

The focus shifted the second week when U.S. paratroopers integrated into the legion's yearly platoon validation course, a field training exercise executed over the entirety of northwestern Corsica with long foot movements over dense mountainous terrain.

Allied paratroopers conducted multiple platoon-level training lanes, with challenges such as water crossings and intensive mountain movements. The event concluded with a test of the U.S. scout platoon's capabilities.

The platoon executed 24-hour reconnaissance and surveillance near Lumio, Corsica, beginning with a nighttime 9 km march through the countryside and a clandestine movement through the city. The platoon then climbed a 2,500-foot mountain and established surveillance sites, providing intelligence collection and reporting to legionnaires. French paratroopers then used information gathered by the Americans to conduct a raid.

"I have enjoyed our time training with the 173rd Airborne Brigade," said French Maj. Jean Baptiste, an operations officer with the 2nd Regiment. "It was a unique experience training with the scout platoon - we do not have a unit like this in the French Foreign Legion."

After this exercise, scout platoon is scheduled to conduct another combined training, this time with 8th Engineer Regiment of the Italian army's Folgore Airborne Brigade. (See related photo, cover)



## Apply now for leadership award

**WIESBADEN, Germany** -- The nomination window for the annual Gen. Douglas MacArthur Leadership Awards competition is now open.

United States Army Europe G1 will accept packets until Nov. 1. All nominees will be evaluated on their overall leadership performance during 2015.

The Army introduced the GDMLA program in 1987 to recognize company-grade and junior warrant officers who demonstrate MacArthur's ideals of "Duty, Honor, Country," and have a proven record of extraordinary performance, leadership and achievement. It promotes and sustains effective junior officer leadership in the Army and is open to second lieutenants through captains and warrant officers through chief warrant officers 2.

Packets must contain a variety of pieces, and GDMLA program overseers are encouraging everyone to start the process as soon as possible.

Winners at USAREUR level will move forward to compete against junior leaders from other major Army commands, where only a few select officers and warrant officers in the active, National Guard and Reserve components across the Army will receive the award.

## US, Hungary conduct joint emergency deployment exercise

**AVIANO AIR BASE** -- American and Hungarian paratroopers conducted a combined emergency deployment readiness exercise Sept. 14 as part of Exercise Brave Warrior, a combined joint forcible entry exercise into Gyor, Hungary.

As the U.S. Army Contingency Response Force in Europe, 173rd Airborne Brigade has a rotating element always standing by, ready to deploy at a moment's notice.

In order to maintain this high state of readiness, the brigade has near-constant training exercises so its paratroopers will be ready should a call come.

One way these paratroopers are tested is through the use of an Emergency Deployment Readiness Exercise, which engages the 18-hour sequence with no notice.

"We do these types of exercises to test our readiness and to maintain our readiness for real-world notification," said Capt. Will Ryan, operational planning officer with 1st Bat-

talion, 503rd Infantry Regiment. "We never know whether or not this is an exercise, so each time we receive a notification like this, we expect it to be real -- this adds to a heightened sense of alertness."

Paratroopers from Company B, 1st Bn. were put through the test when they received a predawn notification on Sept. 15.

"We got the call at 4 a.m. and marshaled in our battalion area," said Ryan. "We immediately conducted troops leading procedures, loaded transportation and moved to Aviano Air Base. Upon arrival we continued our planning process and began preparation for the airborne operation."

Paratroopers received an order from U.S. European Command in support of Exercise Dragoon Crossing, to liaise with Hungarian paratroopers from 88th Light Mixed Battalion, 25th Infantry Brigade, Hungarian Defense Forces. The two forces were to conduct a combined airborne assault into Gyor-Per airport followed by a 15 km tactical road march to secure a bridgehead on the southern bank of the Mo-

soni-Duna river, in preparation for U.S. troops to cross into Hungary.

Approximately 500 Soldiers from the U.S. 4th Infantry Division and 2nd Cavalry Regiment are conducting 800 km vehicle road march using nearly 40 Stryker combat vehicles along with 70 support vehicles from Rose Barracks, Germany, through the Czech and Slovak Republics, ending with a combined U.S. and Hungarian exercise in Hungary.

Once U.S. and Hungarian paratroopers arrive at the bridge, they will secure the site so military engineers can conduct bridging operations, allowing vehicles to cross the river.

The Hungarian paratroopers from 88th Light Mixed Bn. have a history with 173rd, training with the brigade earlier this year. During this exercise and the previous one, the Hungarians deployed with 173rd from Aviano in order to conduct face-to-face combined planning and become more proficient with U.S. parachute equipment.

# Historic redesignation better supports readiness

**TUSCANY** -- A new era began in the heart of Tuscany Oct. 1.

The Army Field Support Battalion-Italy, under the command of Lt. Col. Joe Greenlee, officially redesignated to Army Field Support Battalion-Africa.

"The Soldiers, Department of Army civilians, and Italian employees of the Army Field Support Battalion have served here for over 60 years executing the mission of the Army Materiel Command and the Army Sustainment Command delivering readiness to warfighters around the globe on time, every time," said Col. Todd Bertulis, commander, 405th Army Field Support Brigade.

The depot at Camp Darby has been in existence since 1951. It was originally constructed to support the U.S. forces in Austria during the occupation in 1951-1952. In 1954-1955, the depot became a part of the U.S. Army Europe Depot system.

The AFSBn receives, maintains, stores and issues Army Prepositioned Stocks; links national logistics capabilities and provides logistics solutions to Army units "South of the Alps," especially 173rd Airborne Combat Brigade, U.S. Army Africa, and other strategic partners, to support geographic combatant commander priorities and to enable readiness.

The ceremony marks a new chapter in the battalion's history and highlights AMC's commitment to being the premier provider of readiness to Africa.

Ultimately, AFSBn-Africa will be the portal to the AMC enterprise, helping to ensure Soldiers execute missions throughout the continent with trust in their equipment.

"We are proud to be a part

# Road march commemorates Operation Market Garden

**HARSKAMP, Netherlands** -- An overcast and rainy day did not stop paratroopers from the United States, Netherlands, Poland, Belgium, United Kingdom, Germany and Italy from marching 17 km. Sept. 17 in commemoration of their lost brothers and sisters who fought on the same ground here 71 years ago.

"We still commemorate Market Garden because we still commemorate the Second World War," said Dutch Maj. Gwenda Nielsen, a paratrooper with 11th Air Mobility Brigade and event organizer. "We do not want to forget what happened, to remember how important it is to have freedom and how important it is to have an army that is well trained and professional."

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Seventy-one years prior, the largest airborne operation in history began here. Operation Market, the airborne half of the attack, and Operation Garden, the ground forces part, lasted from Sept. 17 to Sept. 25 and dropped members from the 101st Airborne Division, 82nd Airborne Division, the British 1st Airborne Division and the Polish 1st Independent Parachute Brigade

far behind enemy lines into Nazi territory.

At first, it seemed like the plan to launch the 14,500 paratroopers and 20,000 glider troopers into Holland was going to be successful after American troops seized several bridges, which were the main key strategic objectives to be taken.

Ultimately, the mission was unsuccessful because of fierce German resistance, who halted the allied paratroopers from seizing their objectives and successfully delayed the relief of allied ground forces.

The road march was important to organizers who wanted to commemorate the sacrifices on both sides of Market Garden, and to celebrate the ties they currently enjoy as NATO allies. It was also a chance to experience history, and walk the route British and Polish paratroopers took from their drop zone in Ginkels Heide to their final point of advance in Arnhem.

Command Sgt. Maj. Travis Crow, battalion command sergeant major of 173rd Airborne Brigade's 54th Brigade Engineer Battalion, said the walk is a way for the paratroopers from the various countries to bond and tell stories about their experiences, as well as pay tribute to their

fellow paratroopers who were here 71 years ago.

Several stops were on the way to the culminating point at the bridge in Arnhem, now named Frost Bridge after a British commander who commanded his troops for nearly four days at the site before German tanks, artillery and infantry forced their withdrawal. Stops included the Ginkel Memorial at the start, the Oosterbeek Memorial site and the St. Elisabeths Gasthuis.

Along the route, paratroopers walked with each other, speaking and learning about the history each other's nations played, all while building individual relationships and friendships.

"Being in the military working with our allies, having a shared understanding and being able to do this [the road march] together really creates strong bonds," said Capt. Shane Covert, company commander, 54th Engineer Battalion.

Approximately 1,000 paratroopers from the seven participating nations are in the Netherlands for a series of airborne operations and ceremonies for the 71st anniversary.

# National Cybersecurity Awareness Month highlights need for collective responsibility

**WIESBADEN, Germany** – United States Army Europe Cybersecurity officials want to remind members of the U.S. forces community in Europe that October marks the 12th annual National Cybersecurity Awareness Month, and that it's everyone's duty to protect Army information and communications.

"October's awareness month highlights this year's critical cybersecurity challenges and the importance of recognizing our shared cybersecurity responsibilities," explains Daniel Hingtgen, chief of Cybersecurity, Policy, Programs and Training for the USAREUR office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Communications (G6). "This responsibility extends from the most basic computer user to our most seasoned technical experts, and our most senior USAAREUR leadership."

Cybersecurity experts explain that in today's world Internet usage is a near must, but while people routinely use the internet at work, home, for enjoyment and to connect with friends and family, being constantly connected brings increased risk of theft, fraud and abuse.

"Our reliance on critical infrastructure and the digital technology that operates it makes cybersecurity one of the U.S.'s most important national security priorities, and one in which every American has a role to play," said Hingtgen. "The slogan 'cybersecurity is a team effort' underscores that shared responsibility."

During October, USAREUR cybersecurity officials say they plan to engage the Army in Europe community through events and initiatives designed to raise awareness,

educate people about cybersecurity, and increase the resiliency of cyber infrastructure to prevent or respond to cyber incidents.

Cybersecurity courses will be offered in communities across USAREUR, officials added, to provide social networking systems awareness and training to Soldiers, Department of Defense civilians, contractors and family members in the Army in Europe community.

Sessions will be offered in Vicenza on Oct. 19, 9-11 a.m. and 1:30-3:30 p.m. in the Reel Time Theater.

USAREUR's cybersecurity experts also recommended some basic, year-round cyber security tips:

- Set strong passwords and don't share them with anyone.
- Keep operating systems, browsers, and other critical software optimized by installing updates.
- Maintain an open dialogue with family,

friends and community about Internet safety.

- Limit the amount of personal information you post online and use privacy settings to avoid over-sharing.
- Be cautious about what you receive or read online; if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is.

# CID warns of online romance scams

**QUANTICO, Va.** -- "He loves me, he loves me not." This phrase has been repeated by many looking for love.

In today's world of online dating and social media sites, however, the phrase may have changed from the plucking of petals to a stroke of the keys with "he is real, he is not."

With millions of Americans turning to the Internet for love and companionship, the U.S. Army Criminal Investigation Command warns of romance scams and impersonation fraud that drains one both emotionally and financially.

In the last six months of 2014, online romance scams have cost their victims more than \$82 million, according to the FBI's Internet Crime Complaint Center. The average financial loss from these romance schemes is between \$15,000 and \$20,000.

The Criminal Investigation Command, commonly known as CID, reports many of these cyber criminals pose as U.S. Soldiers or senior Army officers and noncommissioned officers. The criminals often post official Army photographs and biographies in an attempt to build trust with their victims and lure them out of personal and financial information.

Officials warn that perpetrators use both social media and online dating sites, promising love and romance to unsuspecting victims. After the initial introduction, often through very personal, intimate conversations via instant messaging or email, scammers attempt to manipulate and exploit their victims. Tactics used by cyber criminals include preying on their victim's emotions and appealing to their sense of empathy and patriotism.

Before long, the cybercriminal makes a request for money. Complying with these requests often places the victim at risk financially and opens them up to the possibility of becoming a victim of identity theft.

"We cannot stress enough that people need to stop sending money to persons they meet on the Internet and claim to be in the U.S. military," said Chris Grey, Army CID spokesman. "It is heartbreaking to hear these stories over and over again of people who have sent thousands of dollars to someone they have never met and sometimes have never even spoken to on the phone."

Grey explained that the victims are most often unsuspecting women, 30 to 55 years old, who think they are romantically involved with American Soldiers on the Internet, when in fact they are being cyberrobbed by perpetrators thousands of miles away.

Perpetrators often take the true rank and name of a U.S. Soldier who is honorably serving somewhere in the world, or has even left the service, and post that information with photographs of a Soldier downloaded from the Internet. Many of them state they are serving in a combat zone or foreign country, most often West African countries. The perpetrators give excuses for needing money, to include medical care, to return to the states, to sell their car, and to help their children.

"These thieves are very good at what they do. They manipulate the emotions of their victims and will make claims about Army regulations that the public does not know are incorrect," Grey said. "The majority of the time, the service member is not even aware their name and photo is being used in this way."

## **Investigators urge the public to consider the following:**

Be extremely suspicious if you are asked for money for transportation costs, communication fees or marriage processing and medical fees. **DON'T EVER SEND MONEY!**

If you do start an internet-based relationship with someone, research what they are telling you with someone who would know, such as a current or former service member.

Be very suspicious if you never actually speak with the person on the phone or are told you cannot write or receive letters in the mail. Servicemen and women serving overseas will often have an APO or FPO mailing address.

Many negative claims made about the military and the supposed lack of support and services provided to troops overseas are inaccurate. Check the facts.

Be suspicious if you are asked to send money or ship property to a third party or company. Often, the company exists but has no idea or is not a part of the scam.

Be aware of common spelling, grammatical or language errors in the emails. (CID Public Affairs)

Details regarding FLEP eligibility, the application process and service obligation are outlined in Army Regulation 27-1, Chapter 14 (AR 27-1). The eligibility requirements in AR 27-1 are statutory and cannot be waived.

The U.S. Army Europe Office of the Judge Advocate can help interested lieutenants and captains learn more and apply for the program. Application deadline is Nov. 1, and interested applicants are encouraged to visit the program website.

## Receiving postal privileges depends upon compliance

**VICENZA** -- To comply with new European Command-Italian customs regulations for U.S. military mail, every sponsor must sign an acknowledgment of the system.

Sponsors should understand that the Military Postal System is for personal use and the use of sponsored family members only. They must read the Prohibited Items Trifold that clearly states the use of MPS to conduct a business or act on behalf of others not entitled to privileges is strictly prohibited. The trifold also lists the more common items that may not be shipped or received.

Sponsors will be able to sign the required acknowledgement at the Official Mail window or Parcel Pick-up counter at each Postal Service Center on Caserma Ederle, Del Din and Camp Darby. It's important to note that MPS privileges can be revoked if customs rules are violated. Mail is screened 100 percent when traveling to and from the United States.

For more information, stop by the postal service center and speak to employees or the postmaster. Postal service center hours are Monday and Wednesday-Friday, 10 a.m.-5:30 p.m.; Tuesdays, 11:30 a.m.-5:30 p.m. (except for a Tuesday following a federal holiday, in which case the hours are 10 a.m.-5:30 p.m.).

# Firefighter crosses cultures to serve community

## *Vicenza fire inspector earns kudos, respect of fire chief, colleagues*

**VICENZA**-- Quickly responding to a disaster as a firefighter can be the difference between life and death. But if the person he is responding to doesn't speak his language and is in a country different from his own, a rescue could turn complicated.

For Fire Inspector Luca Giaretta, that's the scenario he faces every day.

Giaretta works for the United States Army Garrison Italy's Fire and Emergency Services Department here. He provides emergency services to Americans living and serving in the Vicenza military community.

But Giaretta is an Italian. So every day he's dealing not just with the challenges and stresses of being a firefighter, he's also having to deal with a language and culture that are very different from his own. And he has to learn how to educate and inform people in that different culture about how to stay safe.

"I really like to work with Americans because this has given me the opportunity to enjoy different people with different experiences and cultures," Giaretta said. "This challenges your mind and working together with the right people can combine the best techniques of firefighting. I have made lifelong friends who have significantly added to my life."

Giaretta started out studying law at the University of Trento when he realized that wasn't his passion. He was required by Italian law to serve for at least one year in the military, so he decided to join as a firefighter, a career he has enjoyed ever since.

"I chose to stay in this ca-

reer because of the sense of excitement and satisfaction when my team works together to save lives," he said. "Everything must be done quickly and correctly while your adrenaline is pumping and what you expect is never what you really find. Your mind must be prepared to react to changing situations at any moment."

For Giaretta's boss, USAG Italy Fire Chief Scott DeLay, working with the blended community has a lot of advantages, both professionally and educationally.

"As a team we are all learning a lot about the cultural differences in community fire protection, and how we apply those differences to meet the needs and expectations of our customers," DeLay said.

DeLay's first impression of Giaretta was that of a professional who strives hard to uphold the standards. "He has ensured my initial impressions have not changed. He is a hard worker and wonderful communicator."

DeLay points out that while only about one and a half percent of the people on base utilize his department's services in an emergency capacity, 100 percent of the community utilize their other services every day. His department assists in areas like plans review processes, facility pre-fire planning, community risk assessments and hazard abatement plans.

DeLay stressed that even though his team is usually recognized by the lights and sirens of their fire trucks, Giaretta and his team work hard in the background for the safety of soldiers, civilian and family members. "They really tie the cultural and humanistic pieces together for all of our safety," DeLay said.

Giaretta recently moved into the Fire Prevention office, where he had to learn fire and safety regulations for not just Italy and America; he also had to learn U.S. Army and European standards. Then after one year in his new job he was promoted to the leader of the office. Now he has to train everyone else to understand those regulations. He and his staff, Gianluca Zaffaina and Riccardo Zancan, oversee the safety of more than 400 buildings.

For other firefighters in the department, working with Giaretta is a great

experience. Capt. Ron Grajeda arrived in Vicenza 10 months ago. In that time he said he's grown to know Giaretta fairly well.

"He is an easy person to get along with and you can tell he strives to do a good job. These attributes make working alongside him an enjoyable experience," Grajeda said.

Grajeda said one of the first incidents he and Giaretta worked on together was when a large propane tank had a leak. "My crew and I were requested to stand by to provide fire protection when a contractor discovered the leak and he was expected to fix it in a not so conventional manner."

Grajeda quickly halted the operation after speaking with the worker and contacted Giaretta for support. "He and his crew quickly responded and reinforced our decision to stop the operation."

Grajeda said Giaretta was instrumental in getting key people out to mitigate a potential emergency situation. "Together, with his familiarity of contacts and our ability to identify a safety violation, we prevented a potential disaster."

Grajeda pointed out that Giaretta uses his experience working on the base to play a key role almost every day when dealing with problems that often seem to be recurring. "It's for these reasons that having an Italian workforce is important; they provide the necessary continuity to sustain the everyday mission."

While there can be cultural differences between the American and Italian firefighters, Grajeda said both sides enjoy working together and continually strive to work past their differences.

"Having people like Luca reduces the stress of that. At the end of the day I feel we both can benefit from each other. We all bring something to the table, and we need to learn from it, because together we

# Expert says domestic violence, sexual abuse on the rise in military

**VICENZA** -- Chief of the U.S. Army Military Police School Behavioral Sciences Education & Training Division, Russell Strand, visited USAG Italy Sept. 15-17.

Strand leads the charge in establishing, developing, producing, and conducting U.S. Army sexual assault investigations, domestic violence intervention training, child abuse prevention, and investigation techniques course. His internationally renowned expertise in these types of abuse makes him an extremely valuable resource in times when domestic and sexual violence are on the rise in the military community.

Strand was due to present here one year ago, but needed to drop the visit due to illness. Luckily, Family Advocacy Program at Army Community Service, in concert with the garrison, brigade and U.S. Army Africa SHARP teams, was able to book Strand again for 2015 under the hard work of acting FAP manager, Frannie Packard, and vital coordination of the SHARP SARCS and victim advocates.

Over the course of three days, Strand presented to 750 Soldiers, Department of the Army civilians, local authorities, local national employees, and family members about domestic violence intervention, sexual assault and child abuse at USAG Italy. Strand engaged his audiences, driving home the importance of open communication styles with the victim as well as belief in the victim. Additionally, he allowed audiences to examine methods, tactics and motives of offenders to understand how they operate and intend to remain hidden.

According to Julia Sibilla, director, Army Community Service here, getting speakers like Strand to this installation is a real coup for the community because everyone benefits.

"Creating a strong and resilient community is our top priority, and by working together to bring resiliency building presentations and events to Vicenza, we are better able to achieve this. Frannie (Packard) and the entire ACS team worked with our resiliency partners to make Russ Strand's visit possible," said Sibilla. "We had great command support and I truly believe that all levels of our community benefitted from attending the presentations."

Already looking to the future, FAP and SHARP are discussing plans to have Strand return to USAG Italy as soon as possible, perhaps as early as 2016, to continue to impart his vast knowledge of abuse intervention techniques. If his message continues to spread, organizers hope communities will begin to see the tides turn in the battle against sexual assault, domestic violence and child abuse in the Army as a whole, as well as here in Vicenza.

## *Memo reminds Soldiers, civilians of drug policy*

**VICENZA** -- A few weeks ago, the director of National Intelligence distributed a memo discussing the impact of marijuana decriminalization by several states on the federal security investigation and adjudication standards.

The bottom line is that any changes to state laws do not alter existing federal law or national security guidelines.

By Executive Order, Department of Defense is mandated to maintain a drug-free workplace and a drug-free federal workforce. Use of illegal drugs, like marijuana, may pose a risk to national security

and is inconsistent with Army values and the trust placed on us as public servants.

As marijuana is a Schedule I Controlled Substance, its use is considered unlawful under federal law and therefore relevant to any suitability, fitness or clearance determinations. All personnel are reminded that favorable suitability/fitness determinations for non-sensitive civilian or contractor positions, or favorable clearance adjudications for national security positions are conditions of employment with the federal government. Unlawful use of a controlled substance may be

grounds for clearance denial or revocation, or an unfavorable suitability/fitness determination, and could conceivably result in loss of your job. Supervisors are reminded they are obligated to report any credible derogatory information concerning employees to the security office.

## FPO/APO Restrictions

Goods received duty-free and/or tax-free through the Military Postal Service may not be transferred to any person not authorized to use MPS.

Italian customs officials may conduct random customs inspections at U.S. military mail facilities. All goods are subject to customs inspection.

Italian law prohibits the shipment and receipt of certain items through the mail. They include, but are not limited to, the following:

- corrosives
- flammable items
- poison
- obscene articles
- intoxicating liquids
- alcohol
- tobacco & tobacco products
- illegal drugs
- weapons parts
- ammunition
- imitation arms, paintball guns
- roasted or ground coffee
- nutmeg, vanilla, salt
- mineral salt, saffron
- fruit & vegetables
- plants, soil
- salted, smoked, dried or canned meat

## Fee-free layaway is back for holidays

**DALLAS** – The Army & Air Force Exchange Service is bringing back fee-free layaway, just in time for early holiday shopping. The layaway program ensures plenty of time for military shoppers to pay for gifts while keeping them hidden from prying eyes.

Starting now, the Exchange will waive the \$3 service fee for items that are placed on layaway and paid for by Dec. 24—including toys and bikes. Purchases of \$25 or more are eligible for the layaway plan.

“The Exchange’s layaway program is a convenient way for shoppers to stock



up on gifts for the holidays while staying mindful of their budgets,” said Air Force Chief Master Sgt. Sean Applegate, Exchange senior enlisted adviser. “By waiving the service fee, the Exchange makes it worthwhile for shoppers to give layaway a try and keep gifts hidden from family members who love snooping.”

A deposit of 15 percent is required to hold items on layaway at the Exchange. Shoppers can visit customer service for complete program details and eligibility information.

# Legal office: *They broke it, they buy it!*

**VICENZA** – Moving can be very stressful. This stress is often exacerbated when moving overseas.

With so many things occurring all at once (finding a place to live, adapting to a new culture, getting into a new battle rhythm in your new assignment, enrolling family members into various programs, etc.), it is easy to forget to take the steps necessary to ensure you receive the money to which you are entitled for household goods and unaccompanied baggage damaged during shipment.

Previously, if belongings were damaged during a military move, you were only compensated based on the depreciated or fair market value of the item. This changed in 2007 when Department of Defense entered into a new contract with transportation service providers (TSPs). The contract now enables claimants to obtain full replacement value (FRV) of destroyed or lost items. That is, the TSP is required to replace lost items with a new item, or pay the cost of a new item of the same kind and quality. As this change can mean more money in your pocket, it pays to be fully informed on the process.

First, you must provide notice of loss or damage to the TSP. Obvious loss or damage discovered during delivery must be recorded on the "Notification of Loss/Damage at Delivery" form. Examples of obvious loss or damage are missing boxes, a shattered television, a major gouge running across your dining room table, etc. All other damage must be reported to the TSP within 75 days of the date of delivery, using the Defense Personal Property System (DPS). Second, you must file your claim with the TSP within nine months of delivery, also using DPS.

DPS is a web-based program located within [www.move.mil](http://www.move.mil). If you haven't already done so, you can create a DPS account through [www.move.mil](http://www.move.mil) by providing your personal information. Once registered, you can use DPS to settle claims online directly with your TSP.

Transportation Command promotes DPS as a centralized, integrated system that is the one-stop source for managing personal property moves. DPS is a sophisticated and valuable resource for reporting damage and filing claims. Occasionally, claimants report difficulty accessing DPS or filing their notice of loss and claims in DPS. Your local Military Claims Office recognizes the difficulties claimants can experience with DPS and is ready to assist during every step of the claims process.

If unsatisfied with how the TSP is settling a claim, you may transfer your claim, in whole or in part, to your local Military Claims Office after the TSP makes you a settlement offer or 30 days after your claim's submission to the TSP, whichever is sooner, without forfeiting FRV. The important thing to remember is to "come to claims!" The attorneys and claims examiners can explain how the system works.

Finally, it is important to note that TSP has certain rights under its contract with DoD. The TSP has the right to inspect damaged items during the claims adjudication process. The TSP also has the right to take possession of any item for which it has agreed to pay full replacement value or any item it actually replaces. However, items that are hazardous or dangerous to the health or safety of the claimant or the claimant's family (e.g., broken glass and moldy fabric items) may be thrown out. That said, be sure to document those items with photographs to support your claim before disposing of them.

As always, the claims office understands the sometimes challenging nature of the claims process. Claims personnel are standing by to assist every step of the way.

## Mass warning system needs personnel updates

**VICENZA** -- The Department of the Army is currently implementing AtHoc, a mass warning and notification system, across United States Army installations. AtHoc is a software that delivers real-time messages to community members through telephonic and data devices such as mobile phones, Blackberry, e-mail, and desktop pop-up messages, to name a few.

Although U.S. Army Garrison Italy has been using AtHoc for a number of years, this service was through a locally procured contract that has now expired. USAG Italy is now transitioning to the AtHoc Enterprise solution. This transition requires all users to update their personal information, to include telephonic and data devices, so that they may receive these life-saving messages.

End users can update information by navigating to the USAG Italy MWN "Purple Globe" located at the bottom right hand corner of the computer taskbar. A step-by-step user's guidebook was provided in employees' e-mail. All are asked to distribute throughout each organization and emphasize the importance of updating information. If a computer does not have the correct purple globe, a computer restart or a 119 ticket may be required.

## Maximize settings on Facebook for privacy, security

**GRAFENWOEHR, Germany** -- In a survey conducted in 2014 by the Pew Research Center, Facebook remains by far the most popular social media site.

As a member of the military, and for family members of service members, it is more important than ever to remain vigilant of operational security (OPSEC). Sharing information on a Facebook timeline may seem harmless but can be dangerous to loved ones and fellow Soldiers.

A general tip to ensure security at the basic level is to never accept a friend request from someone you don't know, even if they know a friend of yours. Do not share information that you don't want to become public. Someone might target you for working in the Department of Defense, so be cautious when listing job, military organization, education and contact information. Providing too much information in your profile can leave you exposed to people who want to steal your identity or sensitive operational information.

Understanding what one can and cannot post on Facebook goes a long way in protecting yourself online, but more can be done by adjusting your privacy settings.

There are many ways to protect your privacy on Facebook, and a lot of people are not aware that most information is available for everyone. United States Army Garrison Bavaria did some research on how to set Facebook settings into the highest security level.

Here is how to set the high-

## Don't miss out: Milan Expo ends Oct. 31

**MILAN** -- Time is running out to visit Milan Expo 2015, the World's Fair held here this year. Only about 200 km from Vicenza and 300 km from Livorno, the Expo is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for most people.

The theme for this year's fair is “Feeding the Planet, Energy for Life,” and participating countries are showing the best of their cuisine, technology and innovation. The event is also a platform where countries can share their ideas for a sustainable future and feeding the world's population.

With 145 countries represented, the Expo is no small venture. According to Expo literature, Milan had to compete to be the host city and put in its bid in October 2006. Milan was declared the winner in 2008, and preparation for the exhibition fair began.

In keeping with the theme, the Expo site is broken into clusters, in which different countries share a particular food chain for their part of the world. The clusters include rice; cocoa and chocolate; coffee; fruits and legumes; spices; bio-Mediterranean; islands, sea and food; cereals and tubers; and arid zones. Each country has its own pavilion, and visitors may want to purchase an Expo “passport” to be stamped as you make your way. For five euro apiece, the passport makes a great souvenir.

Visitors to Expo can get there by car and park in the parking area, or take the train and use public transportation (railway or subway) to get to the site at Rho Fiera. Purchasing tickets ahead of time online at [www.expo2015.org](http://www.expo2015.org) is the best option. Lines at the Expo can be long, so having a ticket in advance may speed up the process. Checking out deals with Groupon is also recommended. A regular ticket

costs 39 euro, but with Groupon, this traveler found two for 49. (*Government endorsement is not implied.*)

If you and your family think you'd like to make the trek, plan ahead. Check out the Expo website and/or download the free Expo app, Expo 2015. The exhibition covers a lot of ground, so prior planning will ensure you get to visit the pavilions of your choice and see the special events, shows, or demonstrations you've put on your list.

Wear comfortable shoes and get there when the gates open. You'll be able to cover more ground that way. If traveling with children, make sure to bring some snacks because food can add up quickly. Refillable water bottles are also a good idea; there are water points throughout the Expo.

Get out there and see the world, one pavilion at a time.

est security settings on your Facebook profile.

### Choose who can view

(1) Log into Facebook. Go to Settings, Privacy.

(2) There you have three subjects: 'Who can see my stuff?', 'Who can contact me?', and 'Who can look me up?'

(3) To maximize the security on your page, choose 'Only me' or 'Only friends'. This prevents other people from seeing what you post.

(4) Under 'Who can look me up?' Facebook will ask, "Do you want other search engines to link to your timeline?" Do not let other search engines link to your timeline.

### Maximize privacy

(1) When you post pictures on your timeline, you can change the settings on who can see, comment or add things to it. You can also determine who is allowed to post stuff on your timeline.

(2) Log into Facebook. Go to Settings, Timeline and Tagging.

(3) There you have three subjects: 'Who can add things to my timeline?', 'Who can see things on my timeline?', and 'How can I manage tags people add, and tagging suggestions?'

(4) The best thing to do is to make

this public to just you or your friends only. The best option to not allow friends of friends put items or comments on your pictures and keep this as private as you can.

(5) When you're "tagged" in a post, it means that someone has created a link to your profile. You can turn on Tag Review to review tags friends add to your content before they appear on Facebook. In the 'How can I manage tags people add and tagging suggestions?' section, click edit and click the disabled button and change its setting to enabled.

### Prevent comments on profile

(1) A new update to Facebook allows you to change the size of your profile picture. It also allows you to make the picture private and unclickable.

(2) Through Photoshop, Microsoft paint or any other photo editing software, you can change the size to 180 x 180 pixels. This will make it a square image and smaller. Save this and use this one as your profile picture on Facebook.

(3) Then, click on your profile picture. You will see a new edit button.

(4) Click on the 'Public' dropdown menu and select 'Only Me.'

### No more sharing location

(1) Geotagging is the process of adding geographical identification to photographs, videos, websites and SMS messages. It is the equivalent of adding a 10-digit grid coordinate to everything posted on the Internet. Prevent Facebook from sharing location.

(2) Geotagging is typically done automati-

cally on your tablet or mobile phone. When you first installed Facebook on your tablet or mobile phone, it probably asked for permission to use your phone's location services so that it could provide you with the ability to "check-in" at different locations and tag photos with location information. Revoke this permission in your phone's location services settings area.

(3) There are also apps to strip your geolocation. Koredoko, deGeo (iPhone) or Photo Privacy Editor (Android) are just a few.

(4) If you post to Facebook, you may see a light-gray location description in the lower left of the status box. Always check to see if the location is posted. If it is, remove it. Simply hover your cursor or finger over the location and click the X.
