## Chief of staff cites Russia as No. 1 threat

**WASHINGTON --** Russia should be considered the No. 1 threat to the United States for two reasons, its capability and its intent, said Army Chief of Staff Gen. Mark A. Milley.

"In terms of capability, Russia is the only country on earth that has the capability to destroy the United States of America," Milley said here at the Defense One Summit, Nov. 2.

"It's an existential threat by definition because of their nuclear capabilities. Other countries have nuclear weapons, but none as many as Russia and none have the capability to literally destroy the United States."

Milley noted that while neither he nor anyone else knows what Russia's true intent is, his best guess at intent is based on behavior over the last few years-- a re-organized military, increased capabilities and aggressive foreign policy.

"The situation with Russia is serious and growing more serious," he said. "I see Russia as aggressive, not just assertive."

"I would say, Russia's recent behavior is adversarial to the interest of the United States," Milley said, adding that the United States and its allies have to approach Russia with a strength and balance approach.

"So, we want on the one hand to maintain strength in order to deter further Russian aggression and we need to stand firm where that aggression manifests it-

self, hence things like sanctions and what NATO is doing right now," he said.

"On the flip side, you don't want to shut them off completely, so we have our hands outreached where you have common interests ... so it's not a zero and one calculation ... there's more nuance than that."

U.S. Army Europe Commander Lt. Gen. Ben Hodges said that he, too, would like to see the Russians back at the bargaining table and in the international community.

Meanwhile, the United States and the European Union continue to demonstrate the collective security of NATO through ongoing military exercises called Opera-

tion Atlantic Resolve, which began when Russia went into Ukraine. Hodges said the objective is deterrence. Units participate for about three months in the non-stop Atlantic Resolve rotations, which are multinational in scope.

Last week, Milley returned to Europe and met with the chiefs of the European armies and followed up with a trip to Ukraine.

"The Ukrainian desires continued military support by the United States and continued political and economic support," Milley said. "They're a proud people; they've been sovereign for 25 years

## Ederle public works prunes trees to ensure safety of community

**VICENZA --** The fall season is usually considered appropriate for all the operations involving pruning and trimming trees and plants.

Taking advantage of the beginning of the dormant season, all pine trees were pruned on Caserma Ederle's Olson Avenue, and the project wraps up today.

The project may have caused a few inconveniences for road traffic and parking accessibility but was necessary to prevent future weather-related issues. In fact, starting in fall, but especially during wintertime, natural agents such as wind, heavy rain or, eventually, snow may cause damage to the trees.

"During this past summer, in central Italy, thousands of this type of tree had issues even when the wind storms were not as strong as tornados," said Roberto Segato, chief of Building and Grounds of the Directorate of Public Works.

"The shape of pine trees as 'umbrella inside out' exposes them easily to the ravages of the snow and wind sail effect. The pine trees live in sandy ground and their roots are not as deep as other types of trees, and make them vulnerable," he continued.

Because of safety, the decision was made to start pruning at the beginning of

November. Nine employees worked on the 64 trees that flank Olson Avenue for approximately two weeks.

The last time DPW accomplished this operation was nine years ago, said Segato.

"The cleaning and trimming preserves them also from plant diseases that may put at risk the tree itself," added Segato.

Employees of the DPW Environmental and Entomology section helped with the big project.

"It was a cooperative effort; we all worked together to achieve a good result," DPW entomologist Davide Donà said, while checking one of trees along with his co-worker Giacomo Toniolo.

"Working on this operation had several goals. One was to prevent that probable snowing could break branches that were already broken and, potentially, the falling of the tree," said Franco Lidron, DPW entomologist. "It also helped reduce tree volume and unwanted branches that give to the plant a wrong shape," he continued.

By removing some lower branches and crown's reduction pruning, the trees will benefit and look well proportioned.

Additionally, the reduced quantity of dry branches is a long-term goal because during summertime it will reduce issues of fire hazard, said Lidron.

## Postal centers switch to online customs forms

**VICENZA --** The United States Postal Service is implementing a new online-only customs form for mailing packages that will soon replace the handwritten form customers are currently using, according to the Vicenza Post Office.

Vicenza Postmaster Lonnie L. Heuer says the change will speed up the process for all packages mailed from Italy postal service centers.

"The new customs form allows faster processing at the Postal Finance Counter and mitigates addressing mistakes through verification by USPS," Heuer said.

Customers can continue to use the older forms, but are encouraged to start using the new forms now. Heuer says the date for the change-over hasn't been set yet, but it's good for customers to get used to the new process.

Although U.S. citizens were not specifically targeted in the terrorist attacks in France, travelers should remain vigilant.

Immediately report unattended packages observed in public places, or any other suspicious activities, to law enforcement authorities. Authorities are proactive and will respond immediately.

If there is a security incident or suspicious package, do not linger in the area to observe.

We strongly recommend that U.S. cit-

izens travelling or residing in Italy enroll in the Department of State's Smart Traveler Enrollment Program. STEP enrollment gives you the latest security updates, and makes it easier for the U.S. embassy or nearest U.S. consulate to contact you in an emergency. If you don't have Internet access, enroll directly with the nearest U.S. embassy or consulate.





## Soldiers allowed to wear black socks with PT uniform

WASHINGTON -- Soldiers are now authorized to wear either black or white socks with their Army physical fitness uniform.

Effective immediately, black socks can be worn with either the gray-black PT uniform or the new gold and black uniform.

Like white socks, the black socks must be plain with no logos. The socks can be calf-length or ankle-length, but must at least cover the entire anklebone, according to Sgt. Maj. Eva M. Commons, Army uniform policy sergeant major with G-1.

The new policy comes as a result of Soldiers requesting the change over the last several months, Commons said.

"The senior Army leaders will go out to various installations and receive questions from the field," Commons said. "... One of the ones brought back was the request to be authorized to wear black socks."

Army staff then examined the request, she said. The black

sock question was also placed into a uniform item survey completed in August by 18,588 Soldiers. Almost 67 percent of respondents, or 12,408, said black socks should be authorized.

Since black socks will be optional, there was no production requirement, no cost associated, and the logistical aspect was minimal. So this change was able to go through an abbrevi-

ated board process, Commons said, but added that all of the steps of the Uniform Board process were still completed before the change was considered by the Army chief of staff.

"We were able to get through all of the steps much more quickly and get it approved and get it implemented so Soldiers can start operating under this new guidance," she said.

The new guidance outlined in an Exception to Policy memorandum signed by Lt. Gen. James McConville, Army G-1, dated Nov. 5, 2015. That memo will serve as the authorization for Soldiers to wear black PT socks until DA Pam 670-1 is updated in a few months, Commons said.

Another change to the new DA Pam 670-1 will be the elimination of all reference to the dress green Army Service Uniform. Sept. 30, 2015, was the wear-out date for the green Class A jacket, she explained. All Soldiers should now have the blue ASU.

Other items in the recent uniform survey must go before the Uniform Board at Department of the Army before they can be implemented, Commons explained. The survey included questions about a wind-proof blue Eisenhower jacket, a single-style "campaign hat" for all drill sergeants, and a single-style ASU cap for all Soldiers.

A majority of Soldiers voted for the optional wind-proof Eisenhower jacket meant to be worn in the workplace. A total of 11,613 Soldiers, or 62.5 percent of respondents, were in favor of authorizing the Ike jacket to be worn in addition to the current black windbreaker.

In addition, 10,313 respondents, 55.4 percent, wanted the blue service cap to be the required headgear with ASUs for senior NCOs, officers and warrant officers, instead of the beret.

A representative sample of active-duty, National Guard and Army Reserve troops were asked to complete the survey.

## Civil Relief Act caps interest on pre-service debt

Interested in saving money on credit card or loan payments? Some Soldiers making payments on debt incurred before entering active-duty service may be entitled to a significant interest rate reduction.

The Servicemembers Civil Relief Act sets a six percent interest rate limitation (including any fees or service charges) on debt a Soldier incurred, either individually or jointly with his/her spouse, prior to entering active duty.

The interest rate cap applies to all debts incurred prior to entry into active-duty service, including student loans, credit cards, mortgages and car loans, and remains in effect for the duration of a service member's active-duty service.

Interest in excess of six percent must be forgiven, not just merely postponed, and the amount of the monthly payment must be reduced to reflect the lower interest rate. In appreciation of military service, some lenders may go above and beyond SCRA requirements, volun-

tarily reducing interest rates below the six percent.

As an example of how much a person could save, consider a \$10,000 car loan at 18 percent interest payable over 60 months. The monthly payment on this loan would be \$253.93. If the interest rate were reduced to six percent, the monthly payment on the loan would drop to \$193.33, a savings of \$60.60 per month and \$3,636.00 over the course of the loan. As another example, consider \$75,000 in student loan debt payable over 20 years. The monthly payment on this loan at nine percent interest would be \$674.79, but at six percent would be \$537.32. This is a savings of \$33,000 over the life of the loan.

The SCRA does provide some recourse for creditors. If a Soldier's ability to pay an interest rate above six percent is not "materially affected" by the service obligation, the creditor can seek a waiver of the limitation. However, few creditors are willing to incur the necessary legal expenses to secure court approval of the

higher rate.

In order to take advantage of the interest rate reduction, service members must provide written notice to the creditor and a copy of the military orders bringing the Soldier on active duty. A letter containing the following information is sufficient: 1) account number, 2) start date of active-duty service, 3) a request for a reduction in interest rate pursuant to the SCRA, and 4) a copy of active-duty orders.

Anyone interested in pursuing this can also pick up a template for the letter at the Vicenza Legal Assistance Office. Once Soldiers provide proper notice, the creditor must retroactively reduce the interest rate to six percent for the entire period of active service.

and they're determined to remain a free and independent country."

Turning to the Middle East, the chief said the issues were strategic and that the radical terrorism in its current form of Islamic State of Iraq and Syria, or ISIS, doesn't lend itself to easy solutions and will probably be there for a while.

"The president has given us charge to go ahead and degrade, then destroy ISIS, and we're doing that," he said. "We're adjusting our strategies ... adjusting our tactical and operational approaches to achieve the strategic end state. The Middle East, specifically ISIS, is a problem that we're coming to grips with right now."

The chief summed up his thoughts saying that his main concern was Army readiness.

"None of us can see the future, so the readiness of the military is a fundamental concern and the greatest sin that I or any other general can commit is to send a Soldier, sailor, airman and Marine into combat and harm's way who is not well equipped, trained and ready," he said. "And, we want over-match ... we do not want a level playing field or a fair fight; we want it all in our favor."

# CID warns of blackmail scams

QUANTICO, Va. -- For many, the words extortion and blackmail bring forth images of Hollywood movies, celebrities having illicit affairs and corporations trying to hide a wrongdoing. In today's world of Internet communications, Internet dating, and social networking, extortion and blackmail can happen to anyone who discusses, admits or posts a lapse in judgment or their personal or financial issues over the Internet.

The U.S. Army Criminal Investigation Command warns the Army community to be aware of Internet extortion and blackmail scams and report any instance where a Soldier, Army dependent, or Army civilian is or has been faced with threats involving the payment of money or other valuables.

Extortion and blackmail are crimes that have grave consequences for its victims, to include financial loss.

"In many instances, the situation begins when an unknowing victim is befriended by someone on the Internet, often as part of an online dating or social media site," said Daniel Andrews, director of CID's Computer Crime Investigative Unit.

CID officials said the best thing Soldiers, civilians and their family members can do is to try to prevent it from ever taking place. All are encouraged to be cautious with their online presence and what information they give to people they have met online or via email, and be vigilant when receiving calls from individuals posing as legitimate businesses.

If you receive a phone call or email you believe to be an extortion attempt, take the following measures:

- If the safety or wellbeing of someone is in imminent danger, contact local law enforcement immediately
- Do not reply to the email, click on any links, or open any attachments
- Report the email to the Internet Crime Complaint Center at [www.ic3.gov](http://www.ic3.gov)
- File a complaint with the Federal Trade Commission at [www.ftccomplaintassistant.gov](http://www.ftccomplaintassistant.gov)
- Report the email to your email and Internet service provider
- Move the email to your SPAM folder
- If contacted through social media, report the contact to the social media provider

Soldiers, Army civilians, and their family members who have been threatened with extortion should contact the installation Military Police or CID office.

# Conference addresses key issues

CASERMA EDERLE -- Voices were heard and issues addressed at the U.S. Army Garrison Italy Army Family Action Plan's fiscal year 2016 conference.

The conference, which took place at the Golden Lion on Caserma Ederle in late October, hosted 46 delegates, more than 15 observers, approximately 20 volunteers, and a wide range of subject-matter experts.

Twenty-seven community issues affecting quality of life for military families were submitted prior to the conference. At the conference, volunteers prioritized the issues, local issues were handled there, and Department of the Army issues were forwarded to the next level.

Three work groups were created: teen issues, force support, and family support.

The top two issues in the teen work group were the quality and price of haircuts and on-post medical care for Department of the Army civilians overseas. The top

two issues for the force support work group were financial support for OCONUS spouses and Behavioral Health staffing at the health clinic not meeting increasing need for services. Both the Darby and Vicenza military communities were involved in the delegate body and volunteer staffing team.

Issues were out briefed and addressed at the November Info-X at the Arena.

Customers will enter all information about the package being mailed online and then print out the form to bring with them to the mailroom, Heuer said.

The new system will allow postal employees to scan the form, and all of the customer's information will automatically be entered into the system, Heuer added.

Heuer also recommends residents use the new system as they prepare to mail packages for the holidays. Mailing deadlines for 2015 are listed at the end of this article.

As for mistakes to look out for, Heuer says the biggest issues he sees are customers using incorrect addresses or using boxes with old labels that haven't been properly covered up. He says it's important to double-check your packages before you bring them in.

Finally, as packages from the states start arriving, he says it's important for residents to pick them up as soon as possible, to insure the CMR has room for the next day's shipment.

Even though the holidays can be a busy time, Heuer wants Vicenza residents

to know that every employee at the mail room is dedicated to getting all packages delivered as quickly as possible.

"Knowing that parcels delivered may contain a present from loved ones that will brighten their holiday makes it all worthwhile," Heuer said.

**FLORENCE/LIVORNO** -- On Nov. 11 at the Florence American Cemetery and Memorial, a ceremony took place to honor those who have fallen in the defense of freedom.

Starting this month, the United States consul from Florence will pay a monthly visit to Camp Darby to provide several services, to include official and no-fee passports for active-duty service members, DoD civilians and their family members, tourist passports, social security numbers, reports of birth abroad and notarial services.

Consul services will take place at the Family Affairs office on a first-come, first-served basis, and the monthly visits will be announced in advance. This is an additional service to the one already provided by the Family Affairs office on a daily basis. Applicants also have the option to go to the Consulate in Florence for their government official passports instead of driving to Vicenza.

It is essential to contact the Family Affairs office to check required documents and fees before the consul visit, as the officer will accept only complete applications and packages. For minor passports and reports of birth (under age 16), physical presence of both parents and child is mandatory.

The only accepted means of payment will be a money order that can be purchased at the post office on base, at the Credit Union or at Community Bank. Only original documents will be examined by the consul who will return them to the applicant the same day; no photocopies will be accepted.


